DSM-I	1952	130	106	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Based largely on the Army's "Medical 203," a system of classifying mental disorders, developed at the start of WWII
DSM-II	1968	134	182	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Incorporated principles of psychodynamic and psychoanalytical psychiatry Versions released after 1973 saw homosexuality removed as a disorder and replaced by sexual orientation disturbance
DSM-III	1980	494	265	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Made more consistent with ICD diagnoses and Research Diagnostic Criteria (diagnostic criteria published in the 1970s to ensure consistency between Europe and the U.S.) Multiaxial system developed Decreased focus on psychodynamic view; focus shifted to "symptom-based, categorical diseases" Controversy over the vagueness of "neurosis" sidelined it to parenthetical addition to some disorders
DSM-III-R	1987	567	292	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Reorganization and reclassification of some disorders, elimination of others Sexual orientation disturbance replaced by sexual disorder—not otherwise specified
DSM-IV	1994	886	297	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Long, multi-step process involving literature searches and field trials (published in the <i>DSM Sourcebook</i>) Almost half of entries had the addition of clinical significance criterion
DSM-IV-TR	2000	886	297	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Text revisions to DSM-IV Removal of the distress criterion from tic disorders and some paraphilias
